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### **FOREWORD**

For the second year, the AER General secretariat sends all its members a proposed yearly action plan listing the key priorities and activities for 2014.

This document is based on:

- 1. The priorities discussed by the Autumn AER Committees and Vice Presidents in charge of transversal issues
- 2. The political issues that the President and the Executive Board would like to highlight
- 3. The priorities defined between October and December by the European institutions or any other institutions deemed relevant

The General Secretariat has gathered all the priorities identified by its members and the European institutions (when available) and produced this document listing the key issues that should be worked on.

These issues are not presented per committee topics but per key priorities. This will allow our members to identify possible synergies between committees. For each priority, the document will also mention what the European institutions aim at doing. This will not only encourage us to work on issues that are largely identified as priority issues and recognised as such by various European actors but will also help ensure that EU funding will be available to launch projects and activities.

This year, AER presents 6 rather than 8 priorities and 4 instead of 5 cross cutting issues in order to increase the synergies and make our messages easier to understand.

This document will be sent out to all members on Monday 27 January. Members will have until the 14th of February to send their comments. The amended document will then be presented to the vote of the February Executive Board and Bureau meetings (19th and 20th February). If adopted, the document will become the AER roadmap for the year.

# INTRODUCTION TO THE PROPOSED CROSS-CUTTING ISSUES AND PRIORITIES



### FOUR CROSS CUTTING ISSUES

In 2014, AER proposes to highlight 4 out of the 5 cross-cutting issues from last year. Indeed, regionalism and subsidiarity which was the first cross-cutting issue of 2013 has now been inscribed as an AER priority.

The following four cross-cutting issues are core to the work of AER and are integrated in the six work priorities. The detail of how each priority will contribute to these cross-cutting issues is presented in PART TWO of this document.

### 1. Equal Opportunities

With a newly elected Vice President in charge of Equal Opportunities (EO) and the mainstreaming of this question across all AER committees and the Youth Regional Network, EO is more than ever high on AER's agenda. Each Committee has now two representatives working on EO and the YRN one, pending two. Inequalities of treatment based on gender, race, religion, disabilities, sexual orientation or nationality are unacceptable. In the current economic climate, with less job opportunities and public funding, the issues of equal opportunities is often considered a luxury than can wait for better times. AER has a long history of fighting to ensure that the same opportunities are given to everyone. With the new EO governance, this topic will be, more than ever, a priority for our organisation.

### 2. Citizens

AER has always strived to build a bridge with European citizens. Not only does the work of AER impact on European citizens through its activities for European regions, but AER works hard at directly showing citizens what Europe can do for them. Through its citizens' forums, Youth Regional Network, Eurodyssey Programme, open conferences and summits, AER can be proud of making Europe more accessible to citizens. Because of this recognised involvement towards European citizens, AER receives a yearly « Europe for citizens » operating grant from the European Commission. 2014 is the year of the European Parliament elections. With the risk of high abstention and the rise of anti-European feelings, AER will work hard to convince European citizens of the need of voting. With less and less trust in political institutions, AER's role in bridging this confidence gap is crucial.

### 3. Youth

With a reinforced Youth Regional Network which has now its own legal personality and a highly motivated President and Presidium, youth will this year again be at the heart of AER priorities. With the Eurodyssey programme to facilitate youth mobility, its work on youth participation in public life, school drop-out or youth employment, AER has always been at the forefront of youth policy. The set up of AER's « Youth and Students' Community » in late 2013 will help young people better understand Europe by giving



them access to the work of AER and its YRN. The 2014 priorities will continue to reflect AER's involvement for the future of our children.

### 4. Innovation

Europe's added value in the economic world lies in its highly skilled workforce and its capacity to innovate. With worldwide recognised universities and research centres, Europe needs to continue being a world leader in this field if it wants to get out of the crisis. How to do better with less will be the innovation moto for European regions in 2014.



### **SIX PRIORITIES**

Six priorities have been identified among the conclusions of the AER thematic committees and European institutions work programmes. These priorities will reflect the aforementioned cross-cutting issues and showcase existing synergies between our thematic committees' work. All six priorities are detailed in PART TWO of this document.

### 1. Raising awareness and defending cohesion policy and European funding

Cohesion policy is at the heart of European solidarity and constitutes the main lever for harmonised economic and social development. Together with all the thematic funding programmes, structural funds are essential in these dire times to implement valuable policies for our citizens and impulse economic recovery. AER therefore proposes to work on the following objectives:

- Informing regions on the new developments regarding structural funds and the Common strategic framework
- Organising information cycles on European funding
- Monitoring the first year of implementation of the Common strategic framework
- Continuing to promote the Reichardt report on information and access to European funding

### 2. Developing the regional dimension across Europe and beyond

The essence of AER's work is to promote decentralisation and subsidiarity. All our activities aim at showing that, whatever the policy field, regions do it better! This battle needs to be constantly fought. Reinforcing the weight of the Regions and working for greater regionalisation in the countries of Europe and beyond will therefore continue to be at the heart of AER's work in 2014. AER therefore proposes to work on the following objectives:

- Pursuing the development of a regional best practice database
- Launching the cooperation platform among academic experts within the AER Academic centre
- Organising the « Regionalisation Days » to enhance the dialogue between all levels of governance and to promote regions
- Organising Training Academies to promote the regional dimension

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• Continuing our work on the Eastern Partnership, Black Sea initiative and back the «Carpathian macroregion» initiative.



### 3. Promoting smart and sustainable growth to foster job creation

Unemployment having become a major challenge affecting regions all across Europe, it is now ever the more important to implement smarter, sustainable and targeted regional policies aiming to support job creation. Education and the environment play a crucial role in promoting growth. An educated and well trained youth is key to ensuring a vibrant economy and the environmental challenges in front of us constitute a big opportunity in terms of employment, economic development and innovation. AER therefore proposes to work on the following objectives:

- Publishing a best practice compedium following the AER « crisis summits » cycle
- Lauching the activities of the new Working Group on Investment, business and SMEs
- Organising an AER training academy on funding for education and training
- Continuing the activities of the Working Group on Combating school drop-out
- Organising peer reviews and conferences on energy investments (Interreg IVC project Regions 4 Green Growth project)
- Organising a Training Academy on geothermic energy

### 4. Advocating a healthier, fairer and more inclusive Europe

Ensuring the sustainability of regional health and social services as well as making sure that all our citizens, in their diversity, are listened to and treated with respect are key elements of AER's values. An inclusive Europe, whatever one's health condition, age, gender, origin, religion, nationality or sexual orientation is an AER priority. A Europe where all cultures are treated with equal respect is crucial. AER therefore proposes to work on the following objectives:

- Organising activities in the field of youth, culture and equal opportunities
- Organising activities in the field of health, social policy and innovation in the public sector

### 5. Building further territorial cohesion

In the 28 EU Member States alone, 56% of the population lives in rural areas which represent 91% of the European territory. It is therefore only normal that a large number of AER regions is constituted by rural areas. The links and synergies between rural and urban territories are also crucial. The urban spaces get always closer to rural ones and cities play often a role of economic driving force for a region with, among other things, a high density of research and development centers. For rural and urban territories to live harmoniously together, spatial planning and clear transportation policies are crucial. This is why AER proposes to work on the following objectives:

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- Supporting the first Rur@ct edition on rural development
- Continuing the activities of the working group on rural development
- Expanding the mandate of the working group on regional airports to cover all transportation systems
- Defining a position on the Trans-European Transport Network and connecting Europe facility

# 6. Strengthening AER to face the new challenges of the regions in wider Europe

Since the May 2013 election of the new President and the new governance that went with it, AER has been working hard to strengthen its position on the European stage. If AER wants to be an effective organisation for its members, its messages must be heard, its visibility increased and its positions taken over by the political circles and civil society at large. This is why AER proposes to work on the following objectives:

- Improving AER visibility all over wider Europe and creating links and synergies between the European regions, businesses, youth, thematic partners, medias, EU and international institutions
- Continuing the activities of the working group on rural development
- Continuing to find relevant thematic/geographical/private partners for further synergy and expertise
- Finding tailored sponsorships supporting AER activities
- Facilitating the dissemination of the Committee's / Transversal issues work and actions via the partners
- Raising awareness of key stakeholders such as MEPs, think tanks, universities, foundations about AER activities



### **TOOLS AT AER'S DISPOSAL**

In order to reach these priorities, AER has a list of tools, programmes and partnerships:

### 1. Tools and programmes

- Events such as the European Investments and Business Summits, the Black Sea Summit, the Eastern Partnership Forum and various conferences and workshops throughout the year
- Training Academies: Free two-day seminars on European affairs (seminars on thematic issues; lobbying, or EU decision-making)
- Information cycle on EU funding: information sessions with a view to offering AER members extensive and detailed information on the funding opportunities for 2014-2020
- European projects: AER is a partner of various European projects (Regions 4 Green Growth, Smart Europe, Smart Care, Engaged)
- Breakfast Briefings: the AER Brussels office hosts breakfast briefings on a given topic in order to help the regional officers in Brussels keep track of some policies they might have missed. This enables also AER to brief them about what AER is doing on these topics and how member regions can get involved
- Regional Peer reviews : Detailed methodology allowing regions to exchange best practices in a structured and in depth manner
- Summer Academy (previously called Summer School): annual forum to exchange knowledge and experience. Every year, politicians, civil servants, experts and representatives of the Youth Regional Network meet in an informal setting to strenghten co-operation on a given topic
- Awards: Innovation Award and Most Youth Friendly European Region Award
- Citizens forum/Tales from Europe: Events allowing for a close exchange of information and debate with citizens across Europe
- Youth Regional Network: Brings together nearly 100 youth who participate in the regional decision-making process and bring their point of view on the policies discussed within AER or the policies they deem relevant. Since May 2013 the President of the YRN is a full member of the Executive Board
- Eurodyssey programme: the AER professional mobility programme offers 3 to 7-month internships abroad to young people aged 18 to 30 who are looking for a first job experience. Every year, 600 young people benefit from this programme
- Rur@ct methodology: supporting the transfer of best practices from one region to another through the technical assistance provided by AER to its members
- Academic Centre: database of experts on regionalism to strengthen the position of AER as a main resource centre on decentralisation
- Political Reports: AER members are encouraged, with the support of the AER secretariat, to draft political reports on topics representative of the interests of AER members. These political reports are useful lobbying tools and facilitate the exchange of good practices



### MONITORING AND LOBBYING

- Monitoring EU developments in the fields of structural funds and future funding programmes (DRE/DLP)
- Continuing to promote the Reichardt Report on information and access to European funding (DRE)
- Monitoring the 1st year of implementation of the Common strategic framework in order to assess if the objective of simplification, better coordination and thematic focus are being achieved; (DRE/DLP/DAIAMS)

### **Links with the Cross-cutting issues**

### **Equal Opportunities**

Equal opportunities will be taken into account in this priority because (1) equal opportunities requirements exist to qualify for European funding and will be highlighted (2) funding opportunities exist to promote projects on equal opportunities and will be identified.

#### Citizens

Although this priority is very technical and focused on regional authorities and civil servants, knowing where funding can be found will help investments by regions for European citizens. Moreover, with information being disseminated on funding opportunities the visibility of Europe's action will be enhanced for the citizens.

#### Youth

As already done in 2013, the Youth Regional Network will be invited to training and information seminars to get a sense of what funding can be obtained in their areas of interest.

### Innovation

Given the importance of innovation in the EU 2020 strategy and European Commission work programme, a lot of funding opportunities will relate to innovation programmes. AER will closely follow the development of the new INTERREG and Horizon 2020 programmes. The new financial instruments, which represent an innovative approach to EU funding will be looked at in detail.

### **Equal Opportunities**

The EO messages AER has carried out for years will be shared with regions outside Europe. With the intense work carried out in the Eastern partnership, Black Sea and Southern Mediterranean regions, there is a large potential for EO best practice exchange.

### Citizens

AER's role is to promote the regional dimension across Europe but also to make citizens sensitive to the importance of a decentralised Europe, a Europe of regions is a Europe closer to its citizens. AER will make sure that its message is carried out to the first protagonist of the regional revolution: Europe's citizens.

### Youth

The Youth Regional Network will contribute to the setting up of a strategy to develop cooperation between youth parliaments within Europe and across European borders.

### Innovation

The most decentralised countries are the ones with the highest level of innovation. Sharing the need for more regional dimension in Europe will have an impact, if done properly, on innovation throughout Europe.

### **External action**

Additionally, drivers for boosting education, training, skills, employment and social cohesion will be reinforced through the implementation of EU wide programs such as Erasmus+, the Programme for Employment and Social Innovation, the European Globalization Adjustment Fund and the Fund for European Aid to the Most Deprived.

As part of the Commission's work to boost competitiveness across all policy sectors, and particularly to assist SMEs, the REFIT programme is of particular importance.

The reformed Common Agricultural Policy will also be implemented in order to generate more jobs in rural areas and to build strong foundations for a green economy (...) Reducing adverse environmental impacts will be critical to a sustainable future. Greater resource efficiency should contribute to growth, jobs and enhanced competitiveness particularly through reduced costs for business, as well as bringing significant benefits for health and the environment, lower energy bills and new opportunities for innovation and investment.

Our various projects will no doubt showcase the innovation potential of rural regions. Innovation is also crucial in terms of transportation solutions especially in times of economic constraints.

### Smart, sustainable and inclusive growth

A fully integrated and interconnected single market covering telecoms, energy and transport requires affordable, accessible, efficient and secure network infrastructure. This in turn requires the mobilisation of private and public investment, a clear regulatory framework, the development of skills, and investment in innovation, research and development. The implementation of the Connecting Europe Facility will mobilise the EU budget to catalyse private sector investment in strategic network infrastructure. The Commission will continue its work to promote and develop the EU's potential for tourism.

In transport, citizens should enjoy more efficient networks and be able to switch easily between different modes. The adoption of proposals in areas like rail, airports, air traffic management and ports will both open up new opportunities and support a more competitive infrastructure.
